DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Long Point is located at the end of the road southeast of Neavitt. It over-looks Balls Creek and Broad Creek, and in the distance the Choptank River.

The house is an early 18th century brick gambrel roof structure, three bays long, one and one-half stories tall, laid in Flemish bond with glazed headers on the northwest facade and English bond on the southeast side. On the gable are interlocking diamonds of glazed headers and chevrons up the rake of the roof. A cellar entrance is located on the east side of the gable. There were three tiny windows, one on the second story and two flanking the chimney in the attic. Both facades have a central door and two windows with two dormers above. The dormers have gable roofs in contrast to the more usual shed roofs. Adjacent to the west window of the northwest facade is a patched area resembling a blocked-in window at Orem's Delight, Talbot County. The latter house also has interlocking diamonds on its gable end. Within each gable rises a tall chimney above the steep roof.

On the southwest side of the house is a 1-1/2 story frame wing, also with a chimney in its gable. It has two windows on the first story and one dormer on the gable roof. Built in the early 19th century, this wing has been very altered. Telescoping still farther is a one-story wing and finally a breezeway connected to a garage, all of the latter three being of 20th century date.

The interior of the dwelling originally had a hall and parlor plan, with the stair in the hall, but is now one room. In the first addition is the dining room and in the new wing is the kitchen. Very little remains of the original interior trim.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Long Point is one of Talbot's early 18th century gambrel roof brick dwellings, resembling Troth's Fortune in form, except lacking a tower. Its detailing is similar to Orem's Delight which was constructed around the 1720's-30's. Although the building has been altered over the years, it is a very important vernacular dwelling when considered in relation to others of the period. It is maintained in very fine order and is one of Talbot's modest showplaces.

Ralph Elston was granted a patent in 1661 for "Long Point," 50 acres on a peninsula that lies between Harris and Broad Creeks, just off the Great Choptank River. In 1673 he was also granted 180 acres, "Long Neck," that adjoined to the north. His family included his wife, Ellinore, a son, Ralph Jr., and a daughter, who married Gewobabell Wells (4/153, 1682). It is said he built a house on Long Point in 1663 or 1664.

In 1675 Elston made a deed of gift to his son, Ralph, Jr., of a tract on the Choptank called Elston's. It was to be returned to his wife Ellinore if his son should die without issue or before he was twenty-one. Half of the moveable goods were to go to his wife "to dispose of as she sees fit." Perhaps Ralph Sr. was about to embark on a voyage and wanted to leave his affairs in order.

However, he did survive his wife, and in 1694 married again, this time to Mary, the widow of John Ball. The Balls had had two sons and a daughter, Thomas, Benjamin and Ruth. They were all devout Quakers. John Ball had bought a tract of land in 1688, a part of Edward Lloyd's Hier Dier Lloyd, further up the Choptank River. According to a deed of 1705, Ralph Elston had sold "Long Point" and "Long Neck" to Ennion Williams and William Fishbourne, both eminent Quakers, who then re-sold the properties to Benjamin Ball (10/1) in 1705 for L 100 sterling. This price would indicate that the original house had either burned or was "in very bad repair." There is also on record a 'deed of gift' from Ralph Elston, Jr. to Benjamin Ball in 1702 (9/191) of all Elston's "goods, chattels, premises, monies, debts wherever."

At this point, the picture becomes a little more definitive. Benjamin sold these properties and another one adjoining, "Benjamin's Lott" (granted him by patent in 1704), to his brother, Thomas Ball, in 1720 (12/441). The price was again \downarrow 100 sterling, so no improvements seem to have been undertaken up to this time.

Benjamin moved to Kent Island and Thomas became the owner. While the deed was not recorded until 1720, it is possible that Thomas could have started building his home any time after 1705, around the foundations of the earlier Elston house. The architecture dates it as early eighteenth century.

Thomas Ball died in 1722 (Baldwin Calendar of Wills, Vol. 5, p. 125), and left to his wife, Susannah Kemp Ball, her dower third; to his son, John, "Benjamin's Lott" and the upper portion of "Long Neck"; but to his daughter Mary's son, and his namesake, Thomas Kemp, he left "Long Point." Evidently Thomas Kemp had no children and his sister, Elizabeth (who had married her cousin James Ball) inherited the property. Their daughter, Rachel Ball, the wife of William Shields of Kent County, moved with her husband to moved with her husband to "Long Point" in 1789. Evidently Shields did not prosper and offered the farm for sale in a newspaper advertisement in the Easton Herald in 1799. place is described as "well adapted to grow wheat, corn and tobacco: remarkable for fishing, fowling and oystering," etc. Exactly what result this notice brought is unclear, but it is known that in 1803 Joseph Harrison paid 500 to William Stuart of Anne Arundel County for 148-1/2 acres, parts of several tracts known as "Benjamin's Lott," "Long Neck" and "Long Point" (L30/F211). Thus ended the long tenure of the Elston-Ball families and began the almost equally long one of the Harrisons.

Joseph Harrison undoubtedly "updated" his new home. Surely it was he who added the present mantels and paneling. Joseph left the property to his son, Stephen, who devised it to his sons, Stephen, Jr. and Samuel (Will 9/342, 1845), as tenants in common. In 1877 these two took a mortgage of \$3,000 from Robert B. Dixon. Twenty years later they were unable to make the payments and their cousin, Walter F. Harrison, and his wife, Rowena, took possession in 1895 (122/348).

Walter and Rowena Harrison sold "Long Point" in 1908 to P. William L. Strom, who sold it to Hoagland Gates in 1913. Gates bought two parcels, the "Long Point" acreage (164/449) for \$10,000 and an adjoining acreage from a Mr. Larrimore (175/138).

Mr. Gates made this area into a shooting lodge. He added a number of wooden buildings to accommodate the gunners. Fire leveled these accommodations, but fortunately the old brick house was not damaged. Mr. Gates either didn't wish to or was unable to re-build his hunting lodge, and in 1926 he sold his properties to the Long Point Realty Co. (208/316). This company was also short-lived, and in 1932 the company sold out to John and Lula Martin Dickinson (231/475).

The Dickinsons sold their interest in 1945 to Ralph Balazer and his wife and A. Ream Redsecker and his wife (264/205). The Balazers subsequently sold their interest to the Redseckers in 1955 (326/97).

The present owners are G. Rex Kilbourne, Jr. and his wife, Carol. They bought the property in 1966 (414/83). They are keeping the house and grounds in immaculate condition, and making it a delightful retirement home.




